Values that Inspire, Voices that Drive Change





The closing event of Civil Society Week brought together key partners and collaborators in a close gathering, including organizations involved in the organization of local CSW activities and beyond, as well as representatives from the donor community in Albania. As the week came to an end — a week focused on promoting values and voices that drive change — Partners Albania officially launched the third mandate of the National Resource Centre for Civil Society, a comprehensive platform that continues to strengthen the sector's capacities, amplify its voice, and promote the role of civil society in the democratic development of the country.

NATIONAL EVENT OF CIVIL SOCIETY WEEK 2025

Launch of the New Program of the National Resource Centre 2025–2029





Juliana Hoxha, Director of Partners Albania

Ms. Juliana Hoxha, Director of Partners Albania, described the national event as a moment to recognize the impact of six years of work by the National Resource Centre, a time to prepare for the next four years, but above all, a moment of reflection on the road ahead for the civil society sector. Reflecting on the beginnings in 2019, when the context was different, she noted that Albania now finds itself in a new phase of accelerated European integration.

Ms. Hoxha emphasized the critical importance — now more than ever — of having a strong and resilient civil society in an increasingly challenging environment, characterized by declining financial support, shrinking civic space, and a public discourse that is not always supportive.

She expressed sincere gratitude to the Delegation of the European Union for its long-standing partnership and for being a voice for civil society in many instances. She highlighted that continued support is essential to ensure the sustainable, long-term impact of civil society in the country.



H.E. Mr. Silvio Gonzato, Ambassador of the European Union to Albania

H.E. Mr. Silvio Gonzato, Ambassador of the European Union to Albania, emphasized that progress towards EU membership requires the active involvement of civil society, highlighting its key role not only in the European integration process but also in strengthening democratic values, human rights, accountability, and transparency — particularly through support to communities and addressing gaps in service provision.

The Ambassador underlined the importance of civil society's monitoring role during the implementation of reforms, stressing that progress in EU accession negotiations is measured through tangible results. He expressed concern about the shrinking civic space in the Western Balkans and emphasized the need for sustained support. He also acknowledged the new phase of the National Resource Centre as a catalyst for further strengthening civil society and fostering national-level dialogue.

According to him, events such as Civil Society Week provide important opportunities for dialogue and cooperation. In conclusion, he reaffirmed the EU Delegation's commitment to supporting an enabling legal, fiscal, and financial environment that promotes the continued development of civil society as the voice of citizens and a key actor in the reform and integration process.

CHALLENGES FOR CIVIL SOCIETY

What still restricts the space for Civil Society?

A dedicated part of the event was focus on the presentation of the latest findings and recommendation from the <u>Monitoring Matrix on Enabling Environment for Civil Society Development - Country Report for Albania 2024</u>.

Among the key challenges emphasized were the lack of a functional electronic registry for NPOs, difficulties in financial sustainability, administrative and legal obstacles, as well as the absence of effective dialogue between the sector and public institutions.

To address these challenges, the following key recommendations were provided:

- Public authorities should take urgent measures to comply with the legal obligations for the establishment and making functional of the electronic registry of NPOs
- Reclassification of the NPO sector as "low risk" on AML/CFT issues, by amending the AML/CTF legal framework to this
 regard
- The amendment of Instructions on VAT for donation/grant agreements with donors, including the IPA III Program of the European Union, should be made effective by enabling its practical implementation, both by the NPO sector and private operators in the market.
- The government should strengthen its role as a strategic donor by increasing long-term, transparent funding to support the NPO sector's sustainability.
- The new overdue Road Map 2024–2027 should be approved following an inclusive and transparent consultative process with NPOs and relevant stakeholders, considering the (lack of) results from the implementation of the previous Road Map.
- The consultation mechanisms with NPO sector regarding legislative processes and EU integration agenda should be strengthening by ensuring meaningful participation and accountability.











REFLECTIONS ON COOPERATION

Dialogue with the Sector



In an increasingly challenging environment for civil society organizations, the need for sustainable, tailored, and accessible support remains vital for the sector's functioning.


Within this context, as part of the event discussions, representatives from organizations shared reflections on their experiences and outcomes, highlighting that participation in various programs of the National Resource Centre has directly contributed to strengthening their capacities, enhancing cooperation, and promoting more effective engagement with other actors in the community and beyond.

The panel provided concrete evidence of the impact of some of the Centre's key programs—such as the NPO Academy, involvement in the Code of Standards, engagement in joint advocacy initiatives, support for better inclusion of organizations in European integration processes, as well as networking and promotion through Civil Society Week. What was particularly emphasized was the direct, flexible, and needs-driven approach enabled by the Centre's national and regional outreach through its offices in Tirana, Shkodër, and Vlorë.

This oing collaboration between the Centre and organizations forms the foundation for the third phase of this mandate—with the aim of deepening this support by offering programs that are always based on the sector's current realities, challenges, and potential on the ground.

SECTOR IN FOCUS

Dialogue for the Future



In the final part of the Civil Society Week closing event, an interactive dialogue was held with representatives from non-profit organizations across Albania. The discussion focused on ideas and expectations for the future development of the civil society sector, as well as the personal and professional motivation that keeps these actors engaged and active.

PRIORITIES FOR IMPROVING THE SECTOR IN THE COMING YEARS

Participants emphasized several key areas for advancing the sector, including: strengthening organizational sustainability, building long-term partnerships, and improving access to funding and multi-year projects. They also raised the need for greater transparency, visibility, and credibility of organizations, along with simplifying bureaucratic procedures that often hinder collaboration or access to funding.

INCREASING THE IMPACT OF NPOS' WORK

Throughout the discussion, concrete ways to increase the impact of civil society organizations were identified, such as ensuring sustainable financial support, strengthening networking and cross-sector cooperation, and promoting strategic partnerships with public institutions. The importance of coordinated action, experience sharing between organizations, and greater public outreach was highlighted as essential to creating stronger community impact and influencing public policy.

MOTIVATION TO REMAIN ACTIVE IN CIVIL SOCIETY

In response to the question "What motivates you to stay active in this sector?", participants shared powerful testimonies of dedication—from passion for the causes they defend and the values they represent, to a strong sense of mission to contribute to a more just and inclusive society. Hope for positive change and belief in the potential of communities were mentioned as oing sources of inspiration, despite daily challenges.
